#### 1. Entries

a. All Nebraska State Fair Livestock Entries are online at <a href="https://www.statefair.org/competitions/livestock-exhibitors">https://www.statefair.org/competitions/livestock-exhibitors</a>

#### b. Entry Fees.

- i. \$50 per head for each division entered Includes bedding
- **ii.** Designated livestock exhibitor parking areas will require a parking pass to be purchased. This parking pass can be purchased when completing online entries or at the livestock check-in trailer.
- c. Entering the Youth Dairy Show is a separate entry from entering the Open Class

  Dairy Show. To exhibit in both you must complete entries for both and pay entry fees for both by the entry deadline.
- **d.** All entries must meet health requirements (see Health Regulations and Health Requirements for Animals Exhibited at the 2024 Nebraska State Fair).
- e. No late entries will be accepted after August 15th, 2024, no exception.
- **f.** Substitutions within the same age, same class and same owner will be accepted at check-in. Only one substitution for the original animal will be allowed. There will be no substitutions allowed for different age classifications or owners. NO EXCEPTIONS!

#### 2. Special Rules

- a. All entrants must have read, be familiar with and are subject to the Nebraska State Fair General Livestock Information, Rules and Regulations and Health Requirements for animals exhibited at the Nebraska State Fair. By submitting entry to the Nebraska State Fair exhibitor agrees to abide by these rules.
- b. Additional Health Regulations/Certificate of Veterinary Inspection
  - i. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection MUST accompany all OUT OF STATE animals entered.
  - ii. Nebraska origin animals do NOT require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

- iii. Only animals showing NO signs of infectious or contagious diseases, such as ringworm or abscesses, will be allowed to show.
- c. All classes will be governed by the rules and regulations of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association and the Nebraska State Fair.
- d. All animals exhibited in the Open Class Dairy Cattle Department at the Nebraska State Fair **must be REGISTERED** with their respective breed associations by check-in. Each exhibitor must produce a certificate of registry on or before the day of check-in. No photocopies or applied-for registration papers will be allowed. This is the responsibility of each exhibitor. No exceptions will be allowed.
- e. There is no limit to the number of animals an exhibitor may enter in this division or in any one of these classes. However, there is a limit of two monetary awards per exhibitor per class.
- f. Every female animal over 36 months old must have produced a living calf within 18 months or prove to be with calf.
- g. The Nebraska State Fair maintains a milking parlor where dairy cattle owners may do their milking.
  - i. All dairy cows milked in the milking parlor must be free of all antibiotics and RBST. Any dairy exhibitor that does not abide by this will be held liable for any milk that is contaminated by their cows.
  - ii. Milking facilities will be open during the Nebraska State Fair.
- h. Additional Awards
  - i. Premier Exhibitor Award
    - 1. This award is to be made to the exhibitor winning the most points (not to exceed 6 animals owned and exhibited by exhibitor) in the open single classes, not including the best udder cow class. There is no limit on numbers exhibited, but award automatically figured on the top 6 animals winning the most points. For animals that are jointly owned, the Premier Exhibitor points will go to the exhibitor that entered the animal.
    - 2. Exhibitor is defined as "Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family residing on one farm and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for Premier Exhibitor."
  - ii. Premier Breeder Award
    - 1. This award to be made to the breeder—not to exceed 6 animals (winning the most points in the open single classes, not including the best udder cow class and including animals bred by him/her but exhibited by others). There is no limit on number exhibited, but award automatically figured on top 6 animals winning the most points.
  - iii. In selection of Premier Exhibitor and Premier Breeder awards, the point system is as follows:

- i. The Purebred Dairy Cattle Association Show Ring Code of Ethics
  - i. The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding of registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.
  - ii. PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.
  - iii. The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall, at all times, deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.
  - iv. It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.
  - v. The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.
  - vi. Grooming and Preparation
    - 1. Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (2009), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:
      - a. Changing the natural color of the animal is prohibited (effective 6/1/2015). However, external applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
      - b. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
      - c. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.

- d. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.
- vii. Violations: False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices
  - 1. These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:
    - a. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
    - b. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally
      - i. With an irritant or counterirritant, using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease, using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
    - c. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
    - d. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
    - e. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

#### viii. Exhibitor Responsibility

- 1. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal.
- 2. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.


